

Talia Schaffer is a Distinguished Professor of English at Queens College CUNY and the Graduate Center CUNY. She is the author of *Communities of Care: The Social Ethics of Victorian Fiction* (2021), which has recently received honorary mention



from NAVSA for the best book of 2021; Romance's Rival: Familiar Marriage in Victorian Fiction (2016), which won the NAVSA prize for the best book of the year; Novel Craft: Vicotrian Domestic Handicraft and Nineteenth-Century Fiction (2011); and The Forgotten Female Aesthetes; Literary Culture in Late-Victorian England (2001). Her co-edited volumes include The Routledge Companion to Victorian Literature (2020), with Dennis Denisoff; a special issue of Victorian Review, "Extending Families," with Kelly Hager (2013); and Women and British Aestheticism with Kathy A. Psomiades (1999). She has also edited Literature and Culture at the Fin de Siecle (2006) and Lucas Malet's 1901 novel, The History of Sir Richard Calmady (2003). Schaffer has published more than 50 articles on topics including Victorian familial and marital norms, disability studies, ethical readings, women writers, material culture, popular fiction, and aestheticism.







In Memoriam

Dr. Maria Bachman



(1963-2022)

The Victorians Institute Board and conference organizers dedicate the 2023 conference in honor of Dr. Maria Bachman.

Dr. Maria Bachman was a treasured long-time member of the Victorians Institute. She made a lasting impact on the Institute, serving as past President (2010-2012), Board member, and co-editor of the Victorians Institute Journal. After earning a Bachelor's degree from George Washington University and a Master's from George Mason University, she graduated with a PhD from the University of Tennessee, Knoxville. A prodigious scholar, she co-edited Fear, Loathing, and Victorian Xenophobia (2013), Reality's Dark Light: The Sensational Wilkie Collins (2003), and The Socio-Literary Imaginary in 19th and 20th Century Britain (2020) as well as producing critical editions of Wilkie Collins's "The Dead Hand" and Charles Dickens's "The Bride's Chamber" (2009), and Collins's The Woman in White (2006) and Blind Love (2004). Her curious mind was matched by her empathetic nature; her



students and colleagues at Coastal Carolina and Middle Tennessee State University, as well as many members of this organization, were the recipients of her kindness and support.


Our current editor of Victorians Institute Journal, Albert Pionke, shared this memory of Maria:

"I attended my first VI meeting in 2003. That I returned, again and again, was due to the warm welcome I received, not least from Maria. She encouraged a wide swath of younger scholars to present, to become involved with conference planning, to volunteer for leadership positions, and otherwise to join the intellectual and convivial life of Victorian scholarship. And she led by example, presenting papers that were consistently smart, hosting a conference for which she conjured up a new standard of swag, attending VI business lunches enlivened by her good humor and political savvy, editing VIJ with tact and professionalism, and always adding more to any room she was in than she took from it. I was fortunate enough to find in her an ideal co-editor, first for our collection *The Socio-Literary Imaginary in 19th and 20th Century Britain* and afterwards for VIJ itself. She was also my friend, whom I do and shall miss. And for those of you who never heard her after-dinner story of the Bulgarian masseur, all I can say is, you missed a doozy!"
